Holy Synod of Bishops condemned ban on Patriarch Porfirije from entering Kosovo



The Holy Synod of Bishops of the Serbian Orthodox Church unequivocally condemned the recent actions of the Pristina government, denouncing the "ban" imposed on Patriarch Porfirije from entering Kosovo and urging an end to the violation of human rights endured by the Serbian people.
