A Bright Saturday after the Nativity in Eugene, Oregon



The Saturday after the Nativity, January 11th, 2019, was especially bright this year at the Parish of St. John the Wonderworker in Eugene.

With jubilation, the parish offered His Grace gifts and enjoyed in turn the Autocephaly wine brought to them by the Bishop. Joy and mirth reigned, as a stream of children surrounded the Bishop's table hoping to receive more sweet things. They were not disappointed – candy rained down upon them, this Saturday being truly no exception to this liturgical season of joy. The delight of all only increased, as with the sound of an accordion, many began to dance.

As the beautiful celebration and fellowship drew to a close, Father John urged his parishioners to join His Grace and Father Vidoslav for the celebration of St. Stephen's parish Slava in Milwaukie taking place on the following day. After a parting picture, everyone departed in the peace and joy of Christ.
