

## **Remarks of Archbishop Elpidophoros of America At the Greek Independence Day Gala - The Federation of Hellenic Societies of Greater New York**



Esteemed Leadership and Members of the Federation of Hellenic Societies of Greater New York,

Distinguished Guests,

Reverend Clergy,

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am delighted to be with you on this glorious eve of our Greek Independence Day Parade, whose return has been so intensely anticipated by the Omogenia.

I am proud to have worked with the Όμοσπονδία to bring about this vital event of our community, especially in bringing the mighty Evzones to participate – something that every person who will line Fifth Avenue tomorrow is eagerly waiting to see. And we are eternally grateful to the President of the Hellenic Republic for

granting us their presence.
